As another year comes to end we are extremely excited about 2018. We are pleased to announce that PCG remains strong and are committed to continued growth and efficiencies for the upcoming year.

During 2017 we have successfully installed the Bobst 820 high speed FFG (24,000 boxes/per hr) and will begin installation of our new high speed rotary Die Cutter, that prints both sides of a sheet at the same time, in January of 2018.

This machine will be equipped with 5 colors which will enable us to print 2 colors on the inside and 3 colors on the outside of the box in 1 pass. These machines will give us a competitive advantage in the market place as it will increase our productivity and throughput - they are truly game changers.

For the past year, under the tutelage of industry expert Les Pickering, PCG created a Continuous Improvement Team and has embarked on the very exciting journey of implementing a 5S system. The 5S system is a lean manufacturing tool that improves workplace efficiency and eliminates waste all while reducing costs and boosting productivity. When you walk through the plant you truly see the difference. We look forward to seeing the continued improvements throughout 2018.

Our commitment to capital investment with new primary and ancillary equipment will help us reach our goals of achieving better efficiencies and quality. We are hopeful this will allow us to offer our customers shorter lead times and improved service this upcoming year.

Another major goal for 2018 is "Outstanding Customer Service". We are making major changes in the infrastructure of our Customer Service Department which will help us achieve that goal.

2017 Year End Review (New York)

2017 went by like a camera flash – with over 6000 new LED light bulbs being installed in the facility. To date, it's literally like night and day in the factory.

2017 was the beginning of our Continuous Improvement (CI) initiative which has improved our visual workplacess.

We formally created the CI Team, consisting of four members from various divisions of the factory who have done a fantastic job during the year both learning and moving our facility to the next level more efficiently. The team is being mentored by an outside consulting agency called Quadrant 5 lead by Les Pickering and to



date we have made great progress.
As of January 1, 2018 the 618, 924, 1228A, 1228B, Expertfold and 820 machines received a visual workplace facelift, meaning "everything has a place when you're working" causing an effect of working smarter not harder

Creating a better visual workplace is the 1st phase of our CI process. The

2nd phase is machine calibrations while working more in depth to reduce setup times and meeting the goal that the first box through the machine is acceptable and ready for production. Now that a visual workplace has been created for the first group of machines, The CI Team will now focus on the 1636, Diecutters and Tooling/Support.

To further support the needs of the machineries, a 6000 sqft mezzanine was approved to be built in 2018 which will allow the CI Team to further facilitate our processes and review our ability to setup and run jobs safely and effectively.

In January 2017, the factory took on a massive facelift in conveyorization and relocating several machines in order to receive the new Bobst 820 Flexo. Everyone working in the facility was impacted by this project which had not ended until July after the 820 began to arrive. I would like to thank everyone for working as a team during this difficult period.

The 140 machine, Expertfold and the 224 were all relocated along with the discontinuance of the Saturn, a long standing work horse of PCG. However not to be disappointed, the 820 arrived in July, was up, running in

August; and with focus and concentration from our 820 champions (Sergio Campos and Robert Finch) and the dedicated operators (Joe Garretto, Devin Teitz, Deiby Escobar, Jean desravines) we had a great startup. In fact, according to Bobst it was their finest startup. Congratulations to the original 820 team.

The staff gathered for a cheerful evening to bid farewell to Larry Gately.

In September we grew to a 3 shift machine and in February 2018, we will expand to a 24 x 7 machine. We are certainly looking forward to safely breaking all production records as we learn how to best utilize this leading edge technology based machine. In addition, due to customer demand, Larry and Richie have committed to install the K7 Diecutter which prints on both the top and bottom of a box in a single pass. This revolutionary machine will have a significant impact in our facility and has been rescheduled to go live in March 2018 due to the crazy holiday backlog we experienced

in 2017. The K7 should be as effective as the 820. Furthermore we need to solidify our strappers for finished strapped units. In April 2018, two new Mosca strappers will be installed along with a new stretch wrap machine to handle the growing needs of our customers.

Now let's not forget the fire that occured in the Baler Room requiring 12 weeks of cleaning, the rain/wind storms that lifted the roof vents off the building over the strappers, and the critters that shut us down for 12 hours by eating a wire on an electrical pole near our electric meter. 2017 brought about a lot of challenges and changes however, we tackeled them head on.

Regardless of unforseen circumstances, we need to recognize that we continue to promote employees from within, Charles Pirtz (Corrugator Supervisor), Thomas DiDiego (Converting Supervisor), Devin Tietze (Converting

Supervisor), and Louis Devito (Converting Supervisor). Each of them have done a fantastic job as Operators and have moved into a Supervisor position. "Congratulations to all".

In 2017 we had to say goodbye to Larry Gately and Nik Barron. Larry transitioned into a new industry moving to Austin, Texas and Nik Barron moved to Georgia to be closer to his extended family. These Manufacturing Managers were with us from the beginning in NY and we wish

them well. As we continue to grow all aspects of our business, we wish to congratulate Tim Rouan (Day Mfg. Manager) and Mark McBee (Night Mfg. Manager) who have had an impact on PCG for many years in NY. Management is confident that they will continue to lead their teams respectfully to the next level.

Furthermore, Matt Krenski has been promoted to one of the night time Superintendent roles taking Johnny Cruz's position who has moved to day crew in place of Tim Rouan's vacated Superintendent role.

Brian Sizer. Dominic's prime responsibility is to analyze the data from all aspects of the machines, monitor the machines activities along with the supervision and CI Team to ensure that we are always working safely and at optimum performance.

The confidence provided by Larry & Richie is a compliment of our growth, not limited to adding new positions, creating the CI team and investing in new machineries. We also know we have room to improve upon and while 2017 was a good year with many accomplishments, we've implemented the processes to make 2018 an even better year in production and operations. Our motto for 2018, is "Work Smarter not Harder." We have the tools in place so let's execute these skills in 2018.

Reduce Shipping Cost with Sustainable Packaging

In an effort to create more sustainable packing and cut back on overall freight costs, our Structural Engineer, Dave Nicholson cleverly designed a large End Cap (Point of Purchase Display) for KISS that will meet the clients desire to reduce their freight cost and utilize environmentally friendly measures during production.

In the past, KISS shipped all of their WalMart End Caps fully setup which increased the cost to ship the displays. Because these samples are so large, not many would fit on a standard 40x48 Pallet, only yielding 1 layer high. So Dave designed a large End Cap that is broken down in two halves. The two halves will now ship back to back in a

much smaller height shipper. By keeping the height down, KISS is now able to double stack these displays on a pallet, and on the truck. This saves Kiss freight costs, plus allowing more pack-outs per truck.

This new design is sustainable and allows a more efficient way to ship these large End Caps.

Once the displays arrives at Wal-Mart, they just slide the top half structure, over the bottom half structure to setup. The Kiss Blowout Lash Display pictured below went into production in January 2017.

PCG Attracting High School Students To Careers In Corrugated Packaging

Attracting and retaining employees into corrugated and folding carton manufacturing continues to be one of the most challenging issues the industry faces. Presentations at association meetings and discussions among plant owners often involve attracting and retaining the "next generation" of employees, specifically Millennials, who will soon represent about 50 percent of the U.S. workforce.

There is a school of thought, however, that says that attracting Millennials to careers in the corrugated and folding carton industries is difficult because they are already too old and have likely begun their careers in other more popular and glamorous or "sexy" industries that don't usually involve the manufacturing of paper and paperboard packaging

"If you want to attract young people into our industry, I believe we have to get to them in the high schools," said Richard

Goldberg, Vice President of Operations at Middletown, New York based President Container Group (PCG). "We already have programs for college students through the fine work of the International Corrugated Packaging Foundation (ICPF).

What about attracting the interest of students while they are in high school so they can develop an interest in corrugated manufacturing? Then they can learn where to go for packaging programs in college."

Goldberg noted that many college programs focus on management, structural and graphic design and customer service. But what about operations? "The corrugated industry

> also needs machine operators and production workers. Where will these workers come from? Not every high school student has the desire or the opportunity to go to college," he said. "We need to expose high school students to an industry that they don't even know exists."

To that end, Goldberg struck up a relationship with Nick Longo, a Technology Education teacher at Valley Central High School in nearby Montgomery, New York, who visited PCG with other invited members of the local Council of Industry three years ago. Longo saw the opportunity and the valuable resource PCG

extended to the school and decided to incorporate a lesson in corrugated manufacturing into his Introduction to Engineering class.

PCG provided all the board and supplies the students needed to learn about corrugated and to build something using it. Since Longo started the class, students have constructed corrugated sleds, boats, chairs, and snowboards. One group built a corrugated bridge. Goldberg visited the class regularly over the course of

the semester, beginning with an introductory presentation showing Longo's students a video on PCG and what it does and an AICC video on the importance of safety. Students received blades, gloves and safety glasses.

"It's all about exposing students to the world of

corrugated that most of them don't even know exists," said Goldberg. "It's manufacturing. But they don't really know what that means until they see a video or actually visit a plant to see the machines running to understand what corrugated manufacturing is all about."

Even Longo admitted to not completely understanding manufacturing until he visited PCG, saw the machines in operation and watched how a corrugated box was made.

"At the beginning of my course, we talk about the different types of engineering they will see," said Longo. "They learn the vocabulary of engineering and are introduced to the concept of corrugated. Then they are challenged to design and build something out of corrugated. They learn CAD and become the engineers of their project. I help facilitate the process. The students are doing so much more than just gluing pieces of corrugated together."

Students attend Nick Longo's engineering class every morning of a semester to work on their projects for about 40 minutes at a time. Goldberg has made regular visits to Longo's daily class at Valley Central to consult, teach and help the students through their projects while instilling some foundational lessons in creativity and real world problem solving. He expressed his satisfaction at watching students learn about corrugated. "They come in to the morning class still half asleep. When they begin work-

ing on their corrugated projects, they wake up, they are engaged, they are learning and they are happy. I wish I can get some of my employees to be so enthusiastic!"

PCG continues to provide opportunities for high school interns who want to experience a world-class manufacturing environment, whether it be for community service, something they would like to study in college or perhaps, a future career in

the corrugated industry. "Our door is open to every kid within a hundred miles of here to take a tour of our plant," said Goldberg. "I want them to know that there is a potential career for them here. Whether its one student or five, we are gaining an interest in what we do. Spread over the entire industry, how many students could we attract?"




